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2025 Nominations

Bylaws Article 3, Section 2: The nominating committee shall nominate not more than eight (8) nor fewer than three (3) candidates for the office of member of the Vestry. The nominating committee shall also nominate at least three (3) candidates for the office of lay deputy and at least two (2) candidates for the office of alternate deputy to represent the parish in the Diocesan Convention and shall nominate candidates for the office of lay representative to the Deanery in conformance with deanery requirements. The names of those nominated shall be published at least two (2) weeks before the election. Additional nominations may be made by members entitled to vote if filed with the Accounting Warden at least one week before the election.



2024 Nominating Committee is pleased to nominate the following members for election to the offices of leadership and representation in the following areas:

Vestry

Parish Bylaws, Article 4, Section 1. Those qualified to serve on the Vestry shall be baptized lay persons of at least the age of eighteen (18) years, and members of the Corporation, a majority of whom shall be residents of Pennsylvania, and who shall have been nominated in writing to the Secretary before the time fixed for election as provided in Section 2 of Article 3.

Article 4, Section 2. There shall be no fewer than three (3) and no more than four (4) members of the Vestry elected annually for a three (3) year term, and they shall be ineligible for re-election for one (1) year after their term has expired.

Section 3. There shall be an Accounting Warden elected triennially from the Congregation who shall serve as a member of the Vestry in addition to those elected in accordance with the provisions of Section 2.

Article 4 Section 4. There may be a Youth Representative to the Vestry elected annually for a one-year term who will be eligible for re-election for an additional one-year term. The Representative shall be a baptized lay person of at least thirteen (13) years who shall have been nominated in writing to the Secretary before the time fixed for election, as provided in Section 2 of Article 3. The Youth Representative shall have a seat and voice on the Vestry.

Vestry Nominees' Biographies

Beth Carlin - Worshiped at St. Peter's since 2024 (Three-year term)



I was introduced to St. Peter's by the Teleha family, specifically Liz. I am one of the godparents of Liz's daughter, Charlotte (Charlie). So far at St. Peter's, I have not participated in any committees. I have mostly just stayed a short while for fellowship. I have donated clothing for the garage sale, as well as contributed financial donations to purchase soups, baked goods, and fellowship snacks. Most recently, I contributed to the Angel Piano gifts. I briefly attended Trinity Episcopal Church in Ambler. From 1st to 8th grade, I attended Catholic School at Roman Catholic Church, St. John of the Cross, in Roslyn. At Catholic school, I regularly assisted my mother in running the Box Tops for Education / Campbell's Soup Label collection and tracking.

There, I also participated in choir and continued to attend mass after St. John of the Cross was combined with Queen of Peace Church in Glenside. At some point, I stopped attending.

I currently work remotely as an Enterprise Account Manager for Procure Solutions, a daycare management software company. Prior to my current position, I was the Enterprise Support Manager. This has provided me with experience in hearing and voicing concerns or appreciation from groups of individuals and knowing the appropriate audience to bring those thoughts to. I have successfully prioritized when to push toward a resolution or when to explain why a change cannot be made at this time.

For hobbies, I crochet, knit, and dabble in music. I also enjoy playing video games. For a few years, I ran registration and points for a charity gaming event called RGB LAN, where we brought people together to play games and raise money for three local charities. I still participate in RGB LAN, but now as an attendee. I also previously participated in the Extra Life Guild of Philadelphia, which plays games to raise money for the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

Coming to St. Peter's has been what I miss getting out of church. While I only have close relations with a select few people, St. Peter's is clearly a community of people who care for each other and its surrounding community. Each mass, Reverend Barb makes it clear that all are welcome, which I have not heard as a part of a mass for a long time. All of the baking, food making, and overall activity options St. Peter's provides truly show that the members of the church see themselves as a force for good, and I am honored to be a part of such a caring community.

My immediate family is just myself, my husband Chris, and our dog Maggie. My husband, Chris, and I both work remote jobs while living in Ambler. I work as an Enterprise Account Manager for daycare management software, and my husband works as a Development Services Manager for Independence Mission Schools. Our dog Maggie is a 50+ pound Irish Terrier mix who enjoys walks, especially along the Wissahickon trail.

Sam Hogg - Worshiped at St. Peter's since 1975 (Three-year term)

My wife Joanna and I were drawn to St. Peter's for its opportunities to study and learn more about ultimate questions. We participated in study groups throughout our time here, many of which were led by Rick Pearce.



In addition to leading some workshops on relationships as a family (relational) therapist I helped lead an anti-racism program entitled Sacred Ground, meeting every other week for five months. I served for several years on the Community Partnership Committee as well as at Rummage Sale.

While teaching mathematics in inner-city Philadelphia for 23 years, I earned two master’s degrees and then changed careers to become a family (relational) therapist. As a family (relational) therapist, I found where my deep joy and the world’s deep hunger

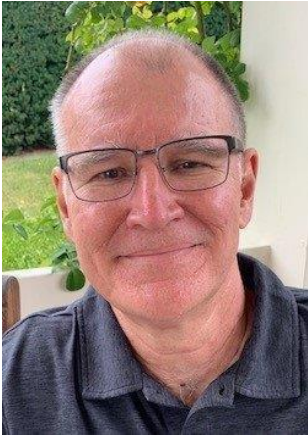

Financial Report

As of this writing (our books are not closed for another few weeks), we ended the year with a surplus of \$59,268 (see charts below). A major contributor to this surplus was the income derived from the boiler campaign. If we discount the effects of the boiler project, we still operated a surplus of \$1,619! This is an accomplishment not seen in many years.

For many years, St. Peter's has maintained self-directed investments with Vanguard. In 2024, the Finance Committee pursued the notion of partnering with a group that had fiduciary responsibilities to our benefit. On the recommendation of Finance, our Vestry passed a resolution directing the establishment of investment accounts with The Church Foundation.

The Church Foundation is a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation and is run by a Board of 16 made up of three clergy and 12 laity and chaired by the Bishop of the Diocese. As such The Church Foundation:

- Serves as trustee, custodian and investment adviser for assets owned by churches, chapels, missions and institutions in the Diocese.
- Administers Diocesan real estate matters as required. The Foundation holds title to more than 100 church and Diocesan properties.

The Foundation's primary activity is overseeing the Consolidated Fund (CF), a balanced fund of stocks and bonds providing a diversified investment medium for the Diocese of Pennsylvania, its parishes and other church-related institutions.

The boiler campaign came to a close in the 4th quarter of 2024. Through a generous matching gift of an unnamed benefactor, we were able to raise the money equaling the cost of the boiler project.

Based on the total contributions during the matching period, we will be receiving an additional \$17,000 which will be earmarked for future capital expenditures.

In closing, my thanks and admiration go to the members of the finance committee; Bill Hower, Anne Gibson, John Klarman, Mike Reeve, Jeanne Robson, and Kevin Sayer. I am always and forever grateful for their good counsel. In recent years, the finance committee has made the decisions that have guided us to a healthier financial position...a position admired by many throughout the diocese.

Property Committee

Property Report

We cannot thank enough everyone over the past two years for their support of the boiler replacement project. After 75 years we now have three state-of-the-art high-tech boilers that have replaced the oil and gas-guzzling furnaces that supported our church over all those years. While they did their job as designed, operating costs, age and conventional systems needed replacement. Through your contributions and the support of the Diocese, we have exceeded our goals, and I am pleased to report that in their first year of operation we have cut energy costs by 40% savings close to \$8,000.

The church steeple was hit by lightning, and we suffered some losses from the electrical arc that traveled through the church. Three of our air conditioning units were damaged, and the steeple itself was bent. The air conditioners were repaired, and we had to remove the steeple. Presently we are looking to see what we will replace the steeple with, and there are several possibilities that we will be sharing with the congregation. Meanwhile all costs so far for the repairs and work on the steeple have been covered (less our \$ 5,000.00 deductible) by our insurance carrier.

The daily upkeep of our facilities as well as renovations and improvements keep staff and volunteers busy. I want to thank the members of the Garden Committee, Debbie and Bob Panebianco, Amy Neske and Eileen Dooley for their dedication and work to keep our grounds looking lovely. Thanks to Kate Boyce for her talented use with a paint brush. Thanks to Joe Mitros, our cleaner, who is here every Thursday evening keeping our building interior clean and bright. Thanks to Mark Evans for taking on the task of the visioning for our building and grounds for their future uses. Enough cannot be said about Tim Valera our caretaker who does so much to make sure our building and grounds are kept in the best of shape, setting up and taking down furniture for our many programs and activities, as well as serving as our eyes and ears, living on our campus and keeping everything safe and secure. Many thanks to you, Tim.

Operations Report

In 2024 the care of the properties at St Peter's Church required a great deal of dedication, time, and money to ensure that our facilities are well maintained. We completed the replacement of our boilers and experienced a lightning strike that damaged our steeple and air conditioners. Thanks to the dedication of Rev. Barb, our church staff, and so many volunteers, we have made great strides to improve church operations including updates to our website, improved parish communications, and enhanced events calendars and message boards along our hallways.

Property Committee and Caretaker

Thanks to the leadership and volunteer efforts of Property Committee Chair Dave Kipphut, and our Caretaker Tim Valera, our buildings and grounds team has been busy completing the installation of the boiler replacement project, managing the impact of the lightning strike, coordinating with various electrical, mechanical, general, and roofing contractors, renovating the small classroom, and planning for the replacement of aging building components including doors, windows, and the steeple. Through the hard work of this group, and the financial support of the parish for new energy efficient boilers, we have been reducing our annual energy costs by at least \$8,000 per year. See the Property Report for further detail on these projects, volunteers, and outcomes. In 2025, we would welcome additional volunteers to assist in this important work.

Church Operations and Communications

Thanks to the strong communication skills of Charlese Freeman, Communications Administrator, and many volunteers, church communications and operations continue to improve. Charlese and Debbie Panebianco have both invested time throughout the year updating the website, refreshing photos of church events, publishing Rev. Barb's weekly blog, and preparing updates to the church brand and logo.

Throughout our hallways, entrances and weekly newsletter, Charlese regularly published and updated event calendars, event notices, new member announcements, and message boards highlighting our ministries and events. In addition, Charlese has been instrumental in managing the insurance claims related to the lightning strike and the unexpected costs associated with the steeple and air conditioning units. We believe that effective communications are strengthening our church community as well as contributing to the growth of our parish over the last three years.

Tenant Relations and Revenue

Thanks to the leadership of Bob Hartung to coordinate the leasing and tenant relations efforts, the church is fortunate to have a number of tenants that support our mission and ministries and generate significant income that helps St Peter's balance our budget each year. However, this effort is ongoing and will require additional tenants, revenues, and physical improvements.

In addition, we have been reviewing municipal regulations to guide our plans to fully utilize the space within our church buildings. Mark Evans and George Luskus have been working on strategies to lease additional underutilized spaces throughout the church, and Charlese Freeman has been contributing to this effort by promoting rentals of the Parish Hall for events. In 2025, we invite all parishioners to get involved in attracting additional event rentals and tenants that align with our church mission and ministries.

Space Use Forums

Mark Evans and Rev. Barb coordinated two Space Use Forums to engage the parish community in discussions about how we use our church and how we can create a plan to renew and refresh various areas of our buildings and grounds. The goal is to enhance our facilities to better support our current and future ministries and mission. The first forum in April looked at Glenside and the Easton Road Arrival Experience and the second forum in October looked at the Parish Hall & the Parking Lot Arrival Experience. In 2025, we will host additional forums with the goal of establishing a strategic plan for how and where to enhance our buildings and grounds.

With this plan, we will be better positioned to secure partnerships and grants that can help us fund future improvements. One example of this type of partnership is the initiative to offer a Community Fridge with fresh refrigerated foods in support of our existing Food Cupboard ministries. This Community Fridge initiative is scheduled to begin in the late Winter of 2025 and it will be supported by a partner organization and funded partially by a grant.

Worship

Worship at St. Peter's in 2024 saw an increase in participants, a choir led by a new music director, additional liturgical ministers, and the addition of an option to receive communion wine through intinction, dipping the Eucharistic bread into a wine cup.

Sacraments

In 2024 we had our first Confirmation class in several years, featuring seven youth and teens. Three adults were received into the church when the bishop visited on Pentecost. The year also saw four baptisms.

On Pentecost, May 19, The Rt. Rev. Daniel Gutiérrez visited St. Peter's for the first time since before COVID, meeting with the Vestry and presiding over sacraments of initiation. More than 280 people attended the service, which included a baptism, and numerous Confirmations and Receptions from three church communities, including St Peter's.

In response to a request for a “first Communion” experience for children, we held a Bread Day retreat for young people and families to learn about the sacrament, and then invited children to dress up and experience an “Awesome Communion” on May 25, receiving the sacrament with intention and celebration.

Liturgical ministers

Carol Cei joined the staff as part-time music director in January of 2024, bringing particular skills in choral direction, as well as in organ and piano.

Bob Smith, a postulant for holy orders to the diaconate, served his internship at St. Peter’s, completing it on Pentecost. He will be ordained to the diaconate in February of 2025.

Additionally, Rosalinda Ibañez Memba was accepted by the diocesan Commission on Ministry as a postulant for the priesthood. Postulancy is an initial time of preparation and testing for ordained ministry.

Additional acolytes and Eucharistic Ministers and Eucharistic visitors were trained this year. We could always use more help in these areas, as well as ushers.

Liturgical practices

This year we added the option of intinction (dipping communion bread into wine) back into the reception of Eucharist. The options of common cup, intinction and gluten-free reception are all offered in separate chalices, allowing for preferences without mixing containers.

Attendance

Our average Sunday attendance continued to grow in 2024, averaging about 90 people on a Sunday, up from 80 last year. Attendance reached as high as 131 on Sundays, not counting holidays and Pentecost.

As always, my gratitude goes out to all who serve in liturgical ministry at St Peter’s: Our Altar Guild, acolytes, lectors, choir and folk group, tech team, and ushers,. Special thanks to our verger, Bob Hartung, who helps coordinate liturgy on Sundays, as well as to the wonderful volunteers who ensure that our fellowship time is filled with good food to share.

Choir & Music

2024...It was a year of *FIRSTS*. Beginning the new year in a new place - St. Peter’s Church in Glenside-set the stage for what would prove to be a year of learning, experimenting and loving.

January began in a somewhat different way as the Epiphany was celebrated the day before the first Sunday of the year. Being in a Church which closely followed a specific lectionary for the year was somewhat of a new endeavor after all of my years in Sacred Music. That first week reunited me with our St. Peter’s Choir, some of whom I met at my interview and audition. I had programmed in time at each rehearsal to review all of the hymns, as many in the 1982 Hymnal were a bit unfamiliar to me but favorites at St. Peter’s. Although there was much joy for me, it was also a time of sadness for St Peter’s with the loss of Art Lorentz-Burnett. It was an honor for me to be able to provide the music for his Memorial Service. Before the month was over we received the news of Rev. Emily Richards’ passing. I was glad to encourage our

Choir Members to participate in the Liturgy for her Services.

February ushered in Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent as we put away all of the Alleluias. My first Pancake Supper was so much fun, and I was grateful for the opportunity to accompany Kristina Marchuk and Debbie DeKalb in the Talent Show. Observing the many other participants, and especially our MC - David Mosteller - gave me an inside look at just how talented the parishioners were in many different ways. During this Lenten period was my first Taizé experience. Holy Week was inspirational, and the Choir was quite enthusiastic regarding the preparations for Maundy Thursday and the Good Friday Tenebrae. Our choral selections were well received. The Choir began to understand that singing in a choir is more than just music - it is an emotional presentation of the text to inspire the congregation and to be a form of prayer. *Go To Dark Gethsemane* really came alive as the choir musically illustrated Jesus' walk to his death. With the help of Tim Flaherty, we secured two Trumpeters from Temple University for a truly glorious Easter Morning. Members of the congregation came forward for our close with the Hallelujah Chorus, and the Sanctuary was bursting with joy!

There are no dull moments at St. Peter's, and with April came time for Confirmation and planning for the Bishop's arrival. Rev. Barb graciously welcomed the confirmands of St. James Church, Collegeville, and their guests along with a smaller group from a Philadelphia church. St. James Choir joined with St. Peter's, and we had two beautiful Anthems on that Sunday morning. One of the young confirmands also composed a hymn, and I was happy to meet with him earlier in the week to introduce him to our organ. Once again, a trumpeter was able to add a special touch as we performed some duets together.

Our Choir began to wind down in May, and we had a special Sunday of music in early June before taking a summer hiatus. It was delightful to celebrate the Choir with a 'Social' at my home for our last rehearsal. St. Peter's is blessed with so many willing souls as we were able to provide beautiful music each week of the Summer with our volunteer soloists - singers and instrumentalists alike. It was a joy for me to work on a more personal level with these wonderful people.

Labor Day arrived earlier than usual, so our first 'return' Sunday in September was graced by the Jazz Sanctuary group. They delighted the parishioners so much that they returned on all Saints/Souls Day in November. I love working with them as they become more familiar with our hymns and more engaging with our Liturgy. "Temporary" singers were welcomed to participate for the Advent-Christmas season. We were able to have three additional singers join us, and one or two may even stay on! (We will try this again for Holy Week and Easter). Advent was a bit new for me as no Christmas music was sung until Christmas Eve. Our Choir presented a beautiful program of Advent Lessons and Carols which was quite inspirational. Christmas Eve was more than I could have anticipated. It was fun to be a tiny part of the PaperBag Pageant...bringing smiles to everyone with their interpretation of the Christmas Story. The

Later Liturgy was introduced by a Congregational Carol Sing and stirring Anthems by the Choir. Roberta Goren was our guest Flutist and I was delighted to compose some extra music to add her in to each piece we were singing. The Liturgy was stirringly beautiful and it was like having that ‘choir of angels’ right in Glenside with us. A glitch with our organ seemed to erase a great deal of the ‘recorded’ music for Christmas Day. Fortunately, I discovered this well in advance and was able to recreate the Christmas morning program. Gratefully, Carol Lorentz-Burnett was my ‘assistant’ and was present to push the right buttons on Christmas morn.

It should be noted that Kathy Flaherty has continued as the Bell Choir Director. It is a pleasure to work with Kathy. I have been their accompanist and also had the joy of teaching them to ‘random ring’. It was beautiful to have them wander through the Church in Advent. Kathy has worked very hard with the ringers and is always ready to have them participate in the liturgy. She and Tim have made my first year at St. Peter’s quite a smooth one and I am grateful to have them as resources.

Carol Lorentz-Burnett has been wonderful as our Choir Librarian. It is a huge task but she is constantly trying to get us reorganized. David Mosteller is always ready with solo work when asked; ditto Meredith Flaherty. Debbie DeKalb and Kristina Marchuk also gave a great deal as singers/instrumentalists.

Approximately 60 volunteers actively serve within these ministries, contributing to the spiritual life and smooth functioning of our worship services.

Features and Functionality

Ministry Scheduler Pro offers several features that enhance the scheduling process:

- **Schedule Changes:** The ability to make adjustments as needed.
- **Sub Requests:** Volunteers can request substitutes directly through the app, streamlining communication.
- **Email Communication:** The app supports sending group emails or individual notifications to volunteers.
- **Login Management:** Providing volunteers with login information to access their schedules and updates.

This tool has allowed for greater flexibility and responsiveness, ensuring that our ministries are staffed effectively while supporting the volunteers who dedicate their time to these roles.

Listening Circle: A Small Group Opportunity

One of the groups meets regularly on Zoom while the other group has been meeting on Zoom during the winter and in person during the fall and spring. Daniel Memorial Library and The Archives

As many of you enter the church from the parking lot every Sunday, the Library sits just waiting for you inside the entry on your left. Light switches inside the doorway to the right illuminate a room full of interesting archival items, and many books of all shapes, sizes, and interests.

Books are arranged based on a classification Code used by churches. A copy of this classification is not only hanging on the outside of the first set of white shelves but also can be found in special label holders where a new classification starts in the shelves.

Besides the books, there is a section of shelving which shows some of our memorabilia from cookbooks of the area, wood blocks used in the old days for printing images on our newsletters and stationery, as well as gifts from our members. Other items of interest may be found around the room. There is an explanation in a clear plastic holder on the back of the double entry doors. Read it as your eyes travel around the room.

As the world changes, our minds may still look for the gentle stimulation of holding a book, turning the pages, and feeling connected to someone else in a unique way. Please come in, sit down, and enjoy. All books, other than reference books, bibles, and service books such as hymnals and prayer books, can be taken home. Use the clipboard to let us know if you have borrowed something. Just return it to the table or one of the open shelves when done.

Besides books, the Library has become the repository of our archives, the accumulation of our records dating back to 1873. Although much of our history was saved, it was not always accessible. Now it is. In the Library around the walls, you will find shelves with binders. The binders are labeled. The

History of St. Philip-in-the-Fields can be found on the low shelf at the back. On the picture wall are binders with some of our more recent Vestry Minutes. On your left as you enter are shelves with documents, pictures, etc. saved from our past. Also, there are binders with sermons from a few of our Rectors as well as the Minutes of the Annual Meetings. We have also compiled a small binder with full page pictures of the ministers of both churches in the order of their first year with their respective churches.

In addition, the pictures on the walls of the Library show our individual church beginnings and end with a picture of how we are today, one church.

Parish Nurse Report

Official Commissioning

The parish nurse was officially commissioned on September 29, 2024, marking the beginning of a dedicated ministry to support the health and wellness of our congregation. My role as the parish nurse is a volunteer staff position within the parish of St. Peter's and works under the direct supervision of Rev. Barb and held to the scope and standards of practice for Faith Community Nurses as well as the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Educational Forum

On the same day as my commissioning, a forum addressing cold, flu, and COVID-19 was presented.

This event provided attendees with valuable information on prevention, symptoms, and treatment, equipping them to better navigate the upcoming winter season.

Development of Pastoral Care Resources

The following resources were created to enhance pastoral care within our parish:

- **Pastoral Care Records and Documentation:** A system for securely maintaining records to ensure consistency and confidentiality.
- **Pastoral Care Small Team Guidelines and Consents:** Clear guidelines and consent forms for team members involved in pastoral care activities.
- **Telephone and Brief Encounter Forms:** Tools for documenting and tracking interactions.
- **Youth and Teen Group Consent & Information Forms:** Dedicated forms to address the specific needs of younger members of the parish. This also gives permission to photograph the youth during program events.
- **Godly Play Information Forms:** This information form is important, especially for those new to St. Peter's.

Health Education and Safety

- **Handwashing and Hand Sanitizer Guides:** Instructions on proper techniques to prevent the spread of illness. Hand sanitizer bottles were replaced throughout the sanctuary and common spaces.
- **Staff training for CPR:** Rhonda Sargo, RN came and trained the parish staff in adult and youth CPR at no cost to the church.
- **Tips from the Parish Nurse:** Articles and advice focusing on staying safe and healthy during the winter months.

Emergency Response

The parish nurse plays an active role in responding to medical emergencies within the parish, ensuring timely care and support during critical situations.

Stewardship Team

Community Partnership Team

The Community Partnership Team (CPT) coordinates social outreach activities for St. Peter's Church. It handles the distribution of monies from the Designated Outreach Fund, and half of the proceeds from the twice-a-year rummage sale and the on-line rummage. They meet the second Thursday evening at 7:00 PM via zoom. The following activities were observed during 2024.

- **January:** Mitten Tree (Box) Mittens, hats, scarves, and sweaters were collected from the congregation. Many were crocheted or knitted by St. Peter’s congregation, as well as family members of the congregation. These were given to the Visiting Nurses of Abington, and the Food Bank of St Peters.
- **May:** Layette Sunday, was celebrated with the congregation making knitted and crocheted sweaters, hats, booties. Many baby items were also purchased. In Fellowship, parishioners made fleece tied receiving blankets. These items were blessed by Rev. Barb on May 12, Mother’s Day and shared between Nurse Family Partnership and St Peter’s Food Pantry. Special thanks to Janice Solla for furnishing the fleece and preparing the blankets for tying. May 12 was also Episcopal Christian Service Day (ECS). Rev Kyle Evans from ECS brought the Sermon and spoke at the adult forum during fellowship. A check of \$ 709 was given to ECS from the offering collected that day.
- **August:** Backpacks and School supplies were collected and were given to Corinth 13, the Out of School Program in Kensington. The items will be used by the children at Corinth 13, but also to see that the children have what is needed in the classroom of their local schools.
- **September:** We celebrated “GRATITUDE”. Members of the congregation wrote notes of things they were thankful for and put them on the gratitude board. The 29th of September was ingathering for the United Thank Offering, and a total of \$1,627.06 was given to UTO. This is the third year in a row that St. Peter’s is number one in the diocese for UTO offering. WAY TOGO St. Peter’s.
- **November:** We joined hands with the Seamen's Church Institute and collected hats, scarves, work gloves, work socks, shaving items, playing cards, gum, hard candy and other personal items. We cut scarves in Fellowship for the Seamen. Thanks to Janice Solla for furnishing the fleece and preparing the scarves for cutting.
- **December:** We again agreed to do the Piano Angels with the Free Church of St John and Christ Church of St Ambrose. Members of the congregation bought 2 gifts apiece for 77 children in the Kensington Area. These are children who attend one of the churches. The gifts will be given to the children in January in honor of the Three Kings Celebration, which the Spanish observe.

People from St. Peter's are invited to attend the celebration, which will consist of the Three Kings presenting the gifts to the children one at a time, the customary Spanish holiday meal and dancing with a Mariachi Band.

The gifts from last year were given by the Three Kings on Sunday, January 7, 2024. Rev Barb and Jess, Mary Rivera, and Rosalinda Ibanez Memba were present to watch. Mary Rivera was given a beautiful handmade plaque from Puerto Rico for all the work she had done with the Kensington children. All had a delicious Spanish meal and enjoyed the Mariachi band. Ask Rev. Barb how the dancing was.

Our Guatemala Connection

Since 2003 St. Peter's Church has maintained a very special relationship with five small congregations in the Northeast area of Guatemala. St. Peter's members who have visited our beloved companions have found these pilgrimages to be inspiring and life-changing adventures.

In addition to visits and communication through Whatsapp, Zoom, and email, the companion relationship involves the following aspects:

- Scholarship Program in which children receive partial scholarships making it possible for their families to keep them in school. Some of our earlier scholarship recipients are now in post high school education programs!
- Medical Emergency Fund provided to the clergy in our companion parishes to use at their discretion to help parishioners who have no medical insurance and serious medical needs.
- Water Filtration Project to help provide safe drinking water to families
- Guatemalan Craft Sales are held periodically which provide income to the St. Peter's Companion Parish Committee for special needs.
- Regular prayer for one another. We also keep each other informed and commit to praying for each other during particularly difficult times.

Some highlights of 2024 were the following:

- Rev. Juan Mejia is pastor of San Mateo, San Timoteo, and San Miguel Todos Los Ángeles. He also served on the committee to elect the new bishop of Guatemala.
- Seminarista Luis Carlos Linares serves San Miguel Arcángel and San Jose. He successfully completed the formation process and passed all his courses at Santo Tomas Apóstol Seminary to bring him closer to ordination as a priest in the Episcopal Church.
- Rev. Ramon Ovalle was elected in July and Consecrated as Bishop of Guatemala on Nov. 24, 2024.
- Guatemala Sunday was celebrated on Dec. 8 with music by the folk group, special food for fellowship hour and a very successful Guatemala sale with crafts from UPAVIM, a women's cooperative in Guatemala City.
- In December we sent money for scholarships and medical emergencies to our companion churches.
- Our companion parishes are deeply grateful for the support of our St. Peter's community. *Thank you for your prayers and your generous donations.*

Our Guatemala Committee meets on Zoom periodically and would welcome interested members. We plan for the Guatemala Sale, have the opportunity to meet with the Diocesan Guatemala Committee, and communicate with our clergy in Guatemala.

Rummage's Annual Report

A new benchmark was reached this year, with the sale raising a grand total of \$ 16,585.00 for the year. We also reached a new high in Random Online Rummage receipts, \$3,300, which is included in the above total. We held a Just Jewelry Sale in both April and October which was well attended and added to the great total above. In addition, we were able to accept donations from our Lutheran neighbor, St. Paul's, as they do not have a rummage sale in the Fall.

Leftovers from the April Sale went to Rev. Memba who used them to help his churches. The Fall Sale ended with Whosoever Gospel Mission and Vietnam Veterans of America coming to pick up what remained. The funds are divided between St. Peter's Church and The Community Partnership Committee.

Random Online Rummage started during the pandemic, and since it has done so well, we want to remind people that these sales go on all year long. For information about this option, simply email Kate Boyce with a picture, if possible, and a description, including any dimensions, brand name, etc. Kate then sends it out to our special email list. When the item is sold, Kate sends the information to the seller and the two parties connect to finalize the sale. However, she may not be able to handle online sales

during the months of the Rummage Sales. If you are not on the Email List, just contact Kate at rummagesale@stpetersglendside.org to add your name.

We could not continue without the help of so many people, many of whom are not even members of our congregation but who come because of an association with our former Thrift Shop or are friends of members. We thank everyone who donated and/or gave time to help. As we hope to continue this event, which started around 1971 when we also did Christmas Bazaar, we know we need a constant list of people who are willing to help. Please put a note in your calendar for April and October. If you are interested, there is a pamphlet in the church office about running the Rummage Sale.

How we do Rummage: The Process

Volunteers – You are the most important part of the process. You are needed to sort things, to determine if they still work, to arrange, measure, cashier, pack, and clean-up. Sign-ups are required, whether paper or online.. New people are paired with experienced helpers.

Sorters and Sorting Days – This is the initial Sunday and the weekdays prior to the sales. There should not be any donations accepted the day of any sale. Donations from our congregation and the community arrive. Donations should not show up before Sunday because we rent out our space, so leaving items prior to the start date could cause problems. Helpers need to be aware of donations that are unacceptable if asked. See list on last page. Items are sorted (damaged goods put in trash) and then placed where designated. If you help sort for an hour, you can also shop. Any items selected for buying must be paid for and removed that day. No items may be placed in the kitchen or anywhere else for later.

Point of Contact Person- The POC person would be available during sorting to answer questions, explain things to people bringing in donations, and helping to encourage our volunteers. If a question or issue arises that the person does not feel they can handle, they can speak with Jeanne Robson.

There are specialized tasks that can be done any time prior to sales.

Electric and Electronics Tester – The job involves certifying that the items work and marking them as such, discarding any non-working items. We have equipment to help with this.

Large Item Pricer - Furniture and large items (pictures, large toys, etc.) not on our price list need to be priced.

Toy Consolidator- Some toys come with lots of pieces. Pieces need to be put in clear plastic bags and attached to the toy.

Hanger Coordinator – We try and use only clear plastic hangers if we have enough. Tubular hangers are collected and placed on the cashier's table for taping together and pricing. Wire hangers may be recycled or trashed. Wooden hangers, if not curved, are kept for our coat rack in the back. Curved ones can be sold. This sorting is also done at cleanup.

Audio/Visual Checker – All items that come in plastic cases must be opened to make sure the appropriate disc or tape is inside. If empty, please throw it out.

Linen Organizer – We need to label items as to what size they are: i.e.- bed linens - Twin, Double, etc. Similarly label towels per price list. Tablecloth sizes should be noted.

Volunteers needed for Sale Days include the following:

Cashiers and Baggers –Price lists are at each station, taped to the wall and displayed on tables.

Saturday Sales are bag sales and half price items. What can fit in a bag that we supply is charged \$5. Items that are too large for a bag are half priced. If people bring their own bags, then the cashier will make a judgment as to how many bags their bag could hold. Comparable size bags are charged \$5, larger bags should be charged more.

Check out Control - people who help direct those to open cashiers.

Helpers - assist taking purchases to cars,

Bad Weather Sale Days - directing people to shelter in inclement weather and then directing them to the sale when we open, and for **Security** - Checking to see that everyone has paid before leaving.

Clean-up and Pack – Normally all clothes and accessories go into large black trash bags. Non clothing items go into boxes. The tables and shoe shelves should be wiped before being put away. Windowsills need to be cleaned, and the floor swept so we are ready for Sunday Fellowship and our renters.

Items that are **not Acceptable for our Rummage Sale** include:

Large items such as sofas, exercise equipment, etc.
Upholstered chairs that are dirty, stained, or torn
Worn sports bottles and plastic ware
Worn out pots, pans, or utensils
Mechanical or electrical items that do NOT work
Clothes or linens that are torn, dirty, smelly, or stained
Games, puzzles, or toys that are broken or missing parts
Computers or monitors
Tube Type Televisions
Textbooks
Broken or dirty tools

What we need to sell should be clean, usable items.

Although some of the items listed above are unacceptable at our Rummage Sale, mostly due to size, you can DONATE them through the Random Online Rummage (RoR) sales organized by Kate Boyce. If you are interested and would be willing to handle the actual transaction from your home, send a picture, description, and dimensions to Kate at rummagesale@stpetersglenside.org she will get in touch with you. Since she handles the signups and advertising in April and October, it would be greatly appreciated if you contacted her the other ten months to sell these items.

Vaccine Clinic

A tiny initiative that started out as a way to protect our congregation is turning into a big service for our community. In the fall of 2023, I had a conversation with the pharmacist at Eric's Pharmacy in Maple Glen and mentioned to him that I would be seeing a bunch of seniors at our luncheon the next day. I was asking for information about Medicare coverage for the covid vaccine. When I told him how many people we would have there, he said that they would come to us. And thus, the first vaccine clinic was born. So, in the fall of 2023 and 24, Eric's offered vaccinations for covid and influenza for our Parish and it was also advertised to our neighbors. Because of this, I have become a member of the Montgomery County Immunization Coalition (MCIC) and now have contact with the county department of health. The director of the Department of Public Health came to speak to our lunch Club about all the vaccines that seniors should be getting.

This has now grown into an Outreach for the much larger community, as the county had lost its site for doing mass vaccination clinics in Eastern Montgomery County. So, starting in fall of 2025, St Peters will be the site for the County's vaccination clinic, which will provide a wonderful service for our extended neighborhood, including the under and uninsured. I am gratified to know that when I asked the group assembled for the annual calendar planning meeting if we should move forward with this idea that there was unequivocal support.

Anti Gun Violence

In June, a few members of St. Peter's met in the library to view a slide show Mary Rivera had prepared to provide information on gun violence facts. A few members from other churches joined the meeting. Some had attended the rally at the Capitol building in May. In September the Diocese, St Luke's parish of Germantown, CeaseFire PA, and the Philadelphia Police Department held a gun buyback at St. Lukes. It was a big success. PPD said it was the largest gun buyback in their history. Some of our members helped with this event.

Rev. Barb stated she was working on getting Soul Shots to come to St. Peters. They only go to 12 locations a year with each location lasting a month. The first week in December we had an organizational meeting for Soul Shots. They will set up January 2. Grant Maurer from CeaseFire PA attended the zoom meeting and said he would have material for a table.

Going into 2025, we want to organize with set dates for at least monthly meetings, more often if needed. We will work with CeaseFire PA and the Anti Gun Violence Committee of the Diocese.
